MEN'S BASKETBALL

The Hartman Era – yep, we can call it that – officially began with a 76-72 victory over the Tacoma Titans on November 18. But the groundwork for this season was laid long before. Through hard work, unselfishness, and commitment to the team ethic, Coach Everett Hartman and his squad of student-athletes have taken the baton from AD Randy Falk and set their sights even more success to come.

Taking the baton from AD Randy Falk has presented some challenges, but Hartman has relied on his 30+ years of coaching experience at the high school and college levels to keep the program focused and on course. This season, Hartman has enjoyed working with a group of versatile scorers and defenders, giving him multiple options. "I'm proud that our team has been competitive in almost every game this season," Hartman says. "We have had chances to win almost all of our games."

What can we expect to see in a Hartman-coached Roadrunner team? Some hallmarks to look for: an up-tempo style of offense and full court pressure defense, which are popular with the players. Come to a Roadrunner game, and fans might expect their pulse to quicken a bit, too.

Hartman relies on his motivated crew of assistant coaches (Todd Zimmerman, Ron Richards, Joe Challe) to filter team expectations down to the players, but after months of practices and games, how do they stay strong? It's all about the "themes": "We have a Theme for each day of the week, Enthusiasm Monday, Appreciation Tuesday, Focus Wednesday, Unselfish Thursday, Accountability Friday, Gameday Saturday, Rest & Relax Sunday," Hartman says. Structuring the week – not just on the court, but in the classroom as well – helps keep the team on course, so they can continue finding success even as the games pile up and classwork demands take precedence. (As Women's coach Deb Herrold puts it, "the season is a marathon, not a sprint." Just try to run a marathon without a proper training regimen. Actually, don't. That'd be insane!)



For Hartman, that's the real measure of success – giving yourself the opportunities to succeed, no matter what "game" you're in. Could be the last two minutes of a mid-season game against Lane, or the last two hours before a big midterm. If you've put in the work from day one, you're on course to win.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

It's year 2 of Women's Basketball's resurgence at LBCC. Sophomore slump? Not with this bunch.

Coach Deb Herrold has noted several signs that this group is rejecting that "slump" idea entirely. For example, the perils of competing in the unfriendly confines of another team's gym. You might expect weaker-willed newbies to wilt under the pressure. However, in an early 5-game stretch on the road, the team won four, leaving Herrold impressed. "I was so pleased with how the girls were able to travel in to an opponent's court and play well enough to win time and again," Herrold says.

Employing Herrold's trademark quick tempo style, the team uses their speed to keep their opponents on their heels. A strong quartet of guards – sophomore veterans Hannah Creswick and Kyia Duvall, and fantastic freshmen Jade Bevandich and Courteney Landis – keep the RPMs high. When the dust settles, the other team is left reeling with those cartoon birds circling 'round their heads.

Of course, having actual sophomores helps resist the "slump." "Our sophomores have provided tremendous leadership," Herrold says. "They have helped build a foundation and culture of the expectation of excellence. Without them, we would not be where we are today." Herrold is particularly proud of how the team has shown growth and maturity off the court as well, maintaining the team work ethic in the classroom. Success on the court is important, but for the program to continue to grow and thrive, Herrold understands academics come first.

From Coach Jayme Frazier's 500th career victory, to the undefeated regular season (39-0!) leading to a spectacular 2nd place overall finish, 2016 was pretty great for Roadrunner Volleyball.

Not one to tout her individual accomplishments, Frazier looks back on the season and reflects on this team's chemistry as a specific highlight of the year. "This was a pretty amazing group," Frazier notes. "They exceeded expectations on the court, and did very well in the class as well, exceeding their goal of 3.25 team GPA, hitting 3.45. They just had a contagious work ethic."

The offseason isn't a time to rest on their laurels, either. Frazier is already preparing for an even better 2017 by signing seven players, getting ready for Spring tournaments, and hitting the weight room. Winter term is also typically reserved for the players' heavier course load, so extra hours are added to study sessions. (3.45 GPAs don't happen overnight!)

The offseason is also a time for turnover, as players move onto the next level. (See callout box.) Frazier understands how the landscape can change completely with the loss of even a couple players from her tight-knit bunch, and strives to maintain the culture of success that, as she puts it, can "radiate into every aspect of their lives" at LBCC and beyond.

Chase Bohman. The 5'10" outside hitter from Creswell, OR, led the NWAC in kills with 411 (4.6 kps) on a 31.0% kill efficiency and was 12th in digs with 284.

Bohman has officially signed with Oregon Institute of Technology where she will study Respiratory Therapy and continue playing volleyball next season.



Frazier led LBCC to 45 victories this season, most in the NWAC, and a perfect 14-0 in the Southern Region while finishing in the top-5 in the NWAC in hitting percentage (.226), kills per set (8.2), and assists per set (7.6).

Coach Frazier reached a major coaching milestone when she collected career win No. 500 on October 26.
